Meeting of Jan 18

President Nemo opened the meeting with a special welcome to President Nemo welcomed the visit of Deanna Cook, McGill Bill Ridley and former member, Josh Ronn. He invited the Kiwanis representative to say a few words. He reminded everyone that our meeting on Feb 15th would be a joint luncheon and feature the Velan Award presentation for 2010. Zivic and carried. Carlo Pugliese introduced our guest speaker, Mark Yamada, with a plea for his help in wading through the chaos of economic predictions for 2011. Known for innovation, Mr Yamada responded in an unusual way with an invitation to consider five pairs of shapely legs, unattached to a body, projected onto a large screen. After listening to what he had to say, he wanted us to guess which legs were female. In reviewing the predictions he made to us last year at this time, Mr Yamada gave himself 51/2 points out of 6, similar to his performance of two years ago. 2010 was a year of disasters - earthquakes in Haiti and China; flooding in Pakistan and Australia. It was also a year of nuclear threats from North Korea, Iran, and from the unrest in Pakistan. State debts are out of control – British children are born with a debt of £20.000 each, more than the cost to educate them. Inflation in China is reported to be 5% but in reality it is closer to 7% or 8%. The economy is climbing back but slowly and the older economies need more time. China is young, the US old. Productivity in China is unbelievable. As for interest rates and commodity prices, they will be up. Stocks: energy will outperform gold. Stock markets in local currencies: the US will outperform Canada. Food production could be a problem in 2011 because



of the wet weather. As for the shapely legs on the screen, Mr Yamada made the point that predictions this year are difficult. He identified as male the legs most people thought were female. Nosa Mohammed thanked Marc Yamada and presented him with a

certificate of appreciation.

The Ministry (of Immigration) lost his application papers for citizenship for 120 days. He was served with an eviction notice. Thanks to the support of various Rotarians, including Bob Velan, Carlo Pugliese and others, he was able to persevere and finally gain citizenship. His work as assistant to the President of the Grace Dart Foundation strengthened a long-held desire to help in the care of the elderly. He was to meet his fiancée at the
